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NCAN LAUNCHED

The National CALD (Culturally and Linguistically Diverse) Ageing Network (NCAN) has been launched in April 2013 to strengthen the policy voice and collective representation of CALD individuals and organisations, as priority turns to the needs of an ageing CALD community.

The web-based communication network, coordinated by the Federation of Ethnic Communities' Councils of Australia (FECCA), will bring together consumers, informal carers, peak bodies and service providers online.

FECCA chairman, Pino Migliorino, said the network will also act as an important tool to implement the CALD Aged Care Strategy announced by the federal government in December. "We want NCAN to be the voice representing the needs and experiences of the older CALD community and for its members to feel empowered and able to be heard," Mr Migliorino told the NCAN launch in Melbourne.

Between 2011 and 2026, Australia's population of older people from CALD backgrounds is expected to increase by over 40 per cent and by 2026, one in four Australians aged 80 and over will be from a CALD background.

Mr Migliorino said the online network will help to create a dialogue on policy issues relevant to CALD background. The online network will help to create a dialogue on policy issues relevant to CALD ageing and aged care, as well as to circulate important information on grant submissions and events. Members of NCAN will be invited to share opinion pieces, contribute articles and to comment on the development of the national CALD Aged Care Strategy.

Mr Migliorino said that with fundamental changes to the aged care system from July 1, facilitating access to resources and information-sharing was fundamental to the intention of the network. Over time through networks grow and interconnect NCAN will become an important capacity building mechanism. It aims to achieve greater equity for CALD elders and relate to the government's aged care reform package, Living Longer Living Better.

The introduction of the Commonwealth HACC Programme enables the development of a consistent aged care system covering basic care at home through to high level care in aged care homes. Older people are thus able to move seamlessly from basic maintenance, support and care services through to more complex care packages or residential care as their needs change.

The services provided under the Commonwealth HACC Program include:

- nursing care
- allied health services like podiatry, physiotherapy and speech pathology
- domestic assistance, including help with cleaning, washing and shopping
- personal care, such as help with bathing, dressing, grooming and eating
- social support
- home maintenance
- home modifications
- assistance with food preparation in the home
- delivery of meals
- transport
- assessment, client care coordination and case management
- counselling, information and advocacy services
- centre-based day care
- support for carers including respite services

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SAMAA CELEBRATED JASHNE BUZURG 2013

South Asian Muslim Association of Australia (SAMAA) celebrated its annual event on 27 April at Auburn Town Hall. Nearly 300 people, including a number of parliamentarians, representatives from aged care agencies along with a large number of elderly & their families, volunteers and well wishers attended the event. Federal Minister for Ageing Hon. Mark Butler sent a video message while those in attendance included Senior Labor MP Laurie Ferguson, Auburn MP and Shadow Minister for Ageing, Disability Services and Mental Health Hon. Barbara Perry who also represented leader of opposition John Robertson, MLC Hon Shaoquett Moslemane, CRC Commissioner Sam Almaliki representing CRC Chair Person Dr Stepan Kerkyashrian, the famous Australian Scientist of Regenerative Neuroscience from Brain & Mind Research Institute at University of Sydney Dr Michael Valenzuela and a few other dignitaries including many senior community leaders.

Ivy Yen, the representative from a major community care provider CareConnect who have arrangements with SAMAA to provide Home Care services, gave a presentation about their services and about changes happening in the sector.

Hon. Mark Butler in his video message congratulated SAMAA for holding Jashne Buzurg. He acknowledged that in the Islamic culture the care of one's elderly parents is considered an honour and a blessing. He spoke about the \$3.7 billion plan which was announced by the Prime Minister Julia Gillard to modernise the aged care system so that it provides the dignity and independence that our elders deserve in later life - regardless of their background. The package - called Living Longer Living Better - is a 10-year blueprint to establish an aged care system that will serve Australia well in the 21st century. And the plan will ensure that we have an aged care system that respects culture and difference and gives older people more choice about where and how they receive support and care.

Hon Laurie Ferguson again applauded SAMAA for its principled stands and commitment. Hon Barbara Perry appreciated SAMAA members for their effort and guaranteed full support from her office. Hon. Laurie Ferguson also presented SAMAA's volunteering awards to Abu Bakar Khan Sadozai, Mrs Naila Hassan and Mrs Irmi Khan for excellence in volunteering with SAMAA.

The Keynote speaker, Dr Michel Valenzuela delivered a captivating talk on how to maintain your brain as you age. He spoke about physical and mental activity in order to prevent dementia. He spoke about the neuro-revolution- a process termed neurogenesis-which proves that we continue to make new brain cells even during old age. A book 'Maintain Your Brain' by Dr Valenzuela proved very popular amongst the audience.

SAMAA official Mr Zahid Jamil briefed the audience about various SAMAA programmes. He said that over past 12 months our main focus has been the volunteering programme through which SAMAA elderly have been receiving different kinds of services from SAMAA volunteers. SAMAA has divided Sydney into 7 major regional areas and it aims to to have a nursing home (with whom SAMAA has signed MOU) and a local volunteering group in each area. He also spoke about challenges in accessing funding for various projects.

He said that there have been instances when a business person of the community has expressed interest in building an aged care facility. SAMAA is always willing to cooperate with any such person or group so as to expedite the objective of building a community aged care facility. If such a facility is built, SAMAA will like to increase its equity by gradually buying units in it once it has sufficient funds to do so.


